Toddler group saved from the brink of closure

A HARD-UP toddlers' group in Cox Green on the brink of closure has been thrown a lifeline.

Cox Green Baby and Toddler Group has been awarded £500 by the Royal Borough's extended schools services from funds designated to the Cox Green area.

The group has been suffering from funding problems, due to spiralling costs, with its funds down to the bare bones, so the cash injection will keep the group afloat.

The extra money will enable the group to pay for running costs and also start arts and crafts again and buy new toys.

The club is the only one of its kind in the community and seen by parents as a vital part of their children's development.

Group organiser Lisa Richards was delighted.

She said: "It is absolutely brilliant news. We can now have art and crafts again and buy some toys."

"The group would face closure if we did not receive it."

She added the group costs around £20 a week to run, with costs increasing all the time due to rising centre costs and session material costs.

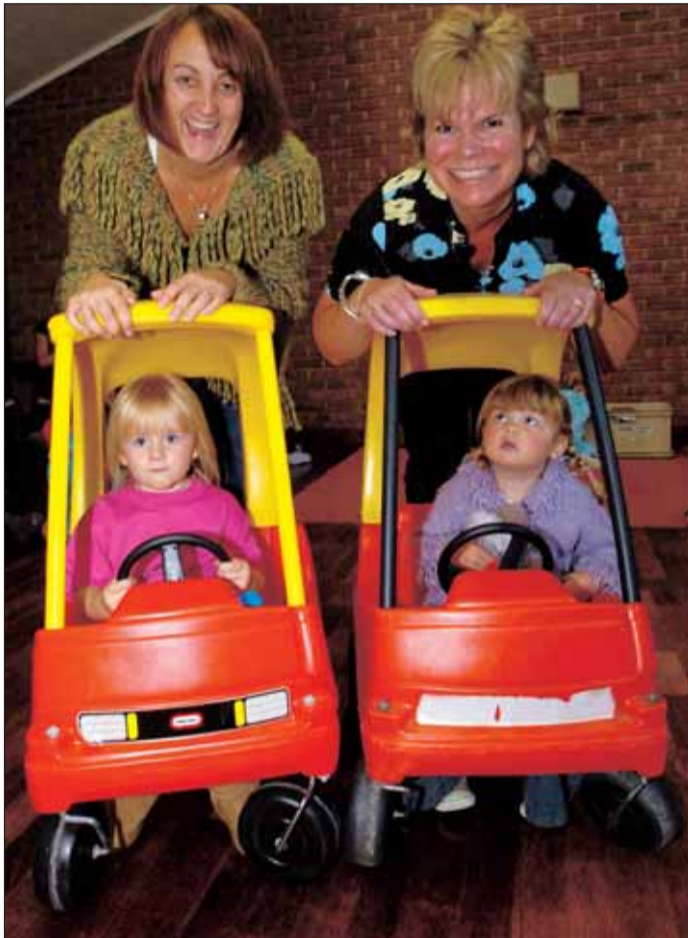
Mother Danielle Gazur, 25, of Cox Green, who takes her two-year-old daughter to the group, was ecstatic when she heard of the news.

She said: "My daughter loves the group and it is good for her to mix with other toddlers."

Mother-of-three Siobhan Perry, 27, of Cox Green, has been taking her children for the past eight years.

She said: "It is a great place for parents and our children to socialise and we all really enjoy the group."

Daisy loves it and I have been coming here for years, so am very happy it will stay."

The group meets every Wednesday from 1.30pm at Cox Green Community Centre in

Highfield Lane.

Out to make an impression

A NEW headteacher at a primary school in Cox Green is on a crusade to improve the standards of his pupils' uniforms.

Nick Stevens, headteacher of Wessex Primary School in St Adrian's Close, says the school is 'let down by how some children look'.

THE relocation of Holyport Manor School to Cox Green is gathering pace with work on the new school set to start in early 2009.

The development has made progress in the past few months since it's approval by councillors at a Royal Borough development control panel meeting on June 5.

An access road is being built and improvements have been made to the intended site off Cannon Lane. Road improvements include pruning of the nearby trees, and drainage and utility work has been carried out in the last month by contractors.

A Royal Borough spokesman said the project is on schedule.

Divided opinion over homes plan

AN APPLICATION to build five detached houses in Waltham St Lawrence has been thrown out by the Royal Borough.

The council's development control panel made the decision on September 17 at a meeting in the town hall.

Housing developer Millgate Homes was proposing to build five homes with five bedrooms

and garages at the site in Woods Yard, West End.

However, parish councillors were supportive of the plan and said it would have reduced the traffic in the village and made the area quieter.

Waltham St Lawrence Parish Council planning leader Clive Scott-Hopkins said: "The view is that it would be better to have a modest

residential estate."

And he added: "The general agreement in the village is that it would have been a positive development because of the traffic considerations."

Woods Yard currently consists of business units offering household items and a range of other things, which the home developer would have demolished.
