



MAIDENHEAD

TERRY CREFFIELD, 25, of Northumbria Road, Maidenhead, was given a two-year conditional discharge and a community order with 40 hours unpaid work for racially aggravated harassment, common assault and assaulting a police constable in Maidenhead on May 23. He was also ordered to pay £100 compensation.

PAUL JOYS, 30, of New Road, Hurley, had his licence endorsed with six penalty points and was fined £300 for driving without insurance in Maidenhead on June 12. He was also ordered to pay £75 costs.

ISIDORE MARUFU, 41, of North Town Road, Maidenhead, was banned from driving for 12 months and fined £200 for drink-driving in Maidenhead on June 14. He was also ordered to pay £75 costs.

TOM BRISBANE, 27, of Ray Park Road, Maidenhead, was fined £75 and ordered to pay £1.80 compensation and £125 costs for travelling on a railway, namely First Great Western, near Slough without paying the fare on April 14.

CHRIS JONES, 43, of Blenheim Road, Maidenhead, was fined £175 and ordered to pay £75 costs for using a television without a licence on October 20 last year.

STEVEN LEE, 43, of Sandisplatt Road, Maidenhead, was fined £175 and ordered to pay £75 costs for using a television without a licence between October 10 and November 11 last year.

MATTHEW MCROBERTS, 21, of Heywood Gardens, Maidenhead, was fined £175 and ordered to pay £75 costs for using a television without a licence between October 17 and November 18 last year.

SUSAN PROCTOR, 33, of Greenfields, Maidenhead, was fined £175 and ordered to pay £75 costs for using a television without a licence on October 29 last year.

MATTHEW SYMONDS, 44, of Sunderland Road, Maidenhead, was fined £175 and ordered to pay £75 costs for using a television without a licence between November 1 and 17 last year.

CHRISTOPHER OORLOFF, 20, of Priors Road, Windsor, was given a 12-month conditional discharge for possession of cannabis in Windsor and breach of an existing conditional discharge, on June 11. He was also ordered to pay £60 costs.

NEIL SMITH, 29, of Broad Leys, Dedworth, was given a community order for failing to comply with the requirements of an existing community order between August 10 and 18 and July 11 and 18 in 2006 and failing to answer to court or bail on August 8 last year.

SARAH HILL, 31, of Queen's Close, Windsor, had an extra five days of education, training and employment activity added to a community order for failing to comply with its requirements by not working as instructed on May 26.

THOMAS STURLEY, 19, of Cinnamon Close, Windsor, had seven extra hours of unpaid work added to a community order for failing to comply with its requirements by not working as instructed on June 3. He was also ordered to pay £50 costs.

Pamper day for carers

CARERS of people with Alzheimer's can enjoy a pampering session from charity volunteers at the United Reformed Church in Maidenhead. Hard-working volunteers of the Alzheimer's Society have organised the monthly event to give carers a temporary respite from the heavy burden of caring for loved ones with the debilitating condition. The first in a series of monthly meetings takes place at the church in West Road on July 20, 10am-1pm, where an alternative therapist will provide tips and techniques on how to deal with stressful situations. Around 30 people are

expected to show up and if it proves to be a success the meetings could be rolled out to Slough and Windsor. "I hope they will feel like they are looked after and that somebody is there for them," said Doreen Gowing, a hypnotherapist whose mother suffered with Alzheimer's.

John Neve – 'He saw the good in people'

A RESPECTED former mayor of Maidenhead has died at his home in Cornwall aged 88.

John Neve spent most of his adult life in Maidenhead working as a gentlemen's outfitter and, following in his father's footsteps, went on to become mayor on two separate occasions.

His father, Harold Neve, was mayor in 1945-47.

After selling the family business John moved to St Agnes in Cornwall with his wife Joyce.

She passed away in 1984 after a battle with multiple sclerosis and John died on Sunday, June 28.

He was born in Maidenhead in 1920 and studied at Maidenhead Grammar School and Durham before the war interrupted his career prospects.

He signed up to the Home Guard and later served with the Royal Navy.

After the war John joined the family business Neve Bros, based in Maidenhead High Street, and kitted men out for the races at Ascot, and also provided clothes for the Carry On films.

During the Fifties, he met a

nurse called Joyce in Taplow and the pair were married at St Luke's Church in Maidenhead on August 7, 1958.

Their first son Simon was born in 1960, followed by daughters, Sally, in 1963 and Susan in 1966.

Elected to Maidenhead Borough Council, he also served on various community groups, including the chamber of commerce, gaining a reputation for community spirit which was rewarded when he became mayor between 1969 and 1971.

"John was a family man, a caring man who spent his life providing for his family in whatever way he could," said son Simon.

"He was a great mixer who tried to see the good in people and if other people followed his lead the world would be a much better place."

John was a keen gardener and bee keeper and also regularly turned out to play bowls for Maidenhead.

He is survived by his three children and four grandchildren.

His funeral service was due to take place in St Agnes, Cornwall, today (Thursday).

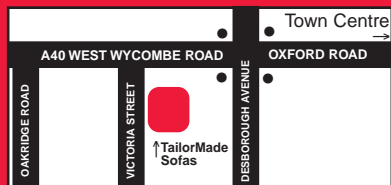

John de Havilland Hall – 'Loved life'

A RESIDENT of the Jesus Hospital Almshouse in Bray and a long-time member of the village community has passed away at the age of 78.

John de Havilland Hall, who had lived at the almshouse for the last seven years, died at Heatherwood Hospital in Ascot on Friday, June 26.

John, a former racing driver, took part in rallies on the European rallying circuit from the age of 18 to 25.

After racing cars he became an engineer, going to work in Maidenhead for many years for an engineering firm in the town.

After the firm shut, John went on to become a recruitment consultant.

The keen motor racing fan lived in Bray for 35 years and could regularly be seen drinking a pint in the Crown Inn, on Bray High Street.

His son Anthony Hall, 44, said: "He was a man who loved life."

"He was well-known and a very friendly and sociable man."

"He liked a drink at the Crown and watching Grand Prix and will be missed by many people."

He is survived by his ex-wife Maggie and his three children Anthony, Frances and Philip.

He also had five grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held for him in the chapel at the Jesus Hospital almshouse on Monday at 11.30am.
